A Word from the Chairman

Dear fellow Wahyanites,

I feel greatly honoured to be elected as the Chairman of our Past Students' Association for the second term and continue to lead the PSA for another year.

Following our last year's effort to "reconnect" our alumni from different generations and countries, we have successfully re-established our regular communications with 28 out of the 43 Past Chairmen, with alumni from every decade starting from 1950s to 2000s, and 13 overseas chapters around the world. We continue to focus on preparing our 100th anniversary celebration and strengthen the communications with our alumni, in particular the younger generations as our core objectives this term. Similar to last term's arrangements, we have identified four focus tasks/initiatives based on these core objectives and each ExCo member is assigned to different task forces/projects with regular reporting in each monthly meeting to the ExCo.

Our four focused tasks/initiatives this term are as follows:

1. Young Member Committee

We have re-established our Young Members Committee last term to connect our younger generations and better prepare succession plans. However, we could not organize any activities due to the pandemic. We wanted to put a stronger focus and effort to connect with our young members and we started by inviting more newly graduated alumni to join our Exco. As of today, we have 36 Exco members across a spectrum of 41 years this term, out of which 8 Exco members were graduated in or after 2019. We also expanded our workforce in the Mentorship Program this term. The Young Members Committee will work closely with the Mentorship Program team to refine the contents of the program in order to fit our students' needs.

2. Membership Database Management

This is the second step of enhancement following our reconnection effort last term. We have recruited more Exco members with IT background this term to enhance the communications with our members. We will also resume our Class representative networks to expand our ways of broadcasting any PSA news and activities to our alumni in a timely manner.

3. WYKPSA Products & Sales

With the dedicated efforts from our Exco members last term, we successfully launched our e-Shop earlier this month (https://eshop.wykpsa.org.hk/). We have formed a team this term to focus on revamping our product lines and offer more exclusive WYKPSA products to our Wah Yan community. Our priorities will focus on producing WYK face masks and some common clothing. Please follow our Facebook page for the latest updates of our launching of new products.

4. Movie Project

We spent a year to prepare for launching the movie project about our beloved Father Naylor under WYKPSA. We have formed an organising committee with representatives from every decade through 1950s to 1990s. Among our organising committee members, we have invited Mr. John Chan ('59), Mr. Stephen Ng ('69) and Mr. Richard Leung ('79) as our Honorary Advisors. Target budget of this project is around HKD8 million to HKD10 million. We secured the initial funding from an alumnus for writing the movie script and appointed Saville Chan ('91), Terence Sin ('90) and Anson Chung ('15) as the scriptwriters. We expect the first draft will be available in mid-November for the Society of Jesus to review and approve. Upon completion of the final draft before the end of this year, we will come up with the detailed plan to our alumni for more fundings.

In addition to the above focused tasks/initiatives, we will continue to publish our newsletters, targeting to release three issues this year with the first publication to be available in early October. In terms of activities, we will resume the gatherings of our fraternity groups. We also plan for an annual visit of the Jesuit fathers' graveyard in Happy Valley to pay our respect and share our memories with those Jesuit fathers with our younger generations during the visit.

Last but not least, I am very grateful for the help and support of our current Exco members, each of them is very proactive in taking up specific roles and duties to fulfil our goals that we want to accomplish this term. We are very excited with our plans and initiatives and looking forward to serve our alma mater and alumni this year!

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Interview with Mr. Warren Chung, Emeritus Principal

In the last issue of the WYKPSA newsletter, the editors interviewed the Principal, Mr. Warren Chung (WYK 79'), in his last academic term. He shared about his school life in WYK, his observations about Wahyanites in the present and those in the past, the current development of WYK, as well as his plan after his retirement.

His School Life in WYK

Mr. Chung entered WYK in 1974. He was first profoundly impressed by the vast and verdant campus, and WYK was, and still is, his "dream school". Fr. Reid was the school principal then, and Fr. Deignan succeeded him in 1978 when Mr. Chung was in Form Four. Fr. Reid was a perfect administrator, as lauded by Mr. Francis Kwong, while Fr. Deignan was the quintessence of compassion.

"In the 70s, Wahyanites were simple and genuine, and they were gentlemanly." Under this atmosphere, most of his classmates, especially in the junior forms, advocated clean speech. Mr. Chung regarded that as an example of how one's life could influence others. He remembered that WYK gave many freedoms for students to have whole-person development, while Wanyanites treasured every opportunity to study, given that most families had very few resources for their children, and education was a means of climbing up the social ladder.

Observations on the Present-Day Wahyanites

"It is a different era now. This generation of students were born with computers." He notices that the current students are more creative and can easily master new technologies and multimedia. On the other hand, they are less committed and weaker in self-awareness. They feel good in the virtual world but might not find their purpose in life in reality. As educators, we need to give them more guidance and inspiration to unlock their potential through education and training so that they can have the competence to be Men for and with Others.



Mr. Chung tried to unleash Wahyanites' potential by promoting values education, the Examen and self-directed learning. The Jesuit core values are (i) love and care, (ii) striving for excellence, (iii) respect and justice, (iv) responsibility and (v) faith. With positive values in their hearts, they will be able to make better choices in the future. Every day, the class teachers spend 10 minutes with their classes to practise the Examen, mindful meditation, which is a tool for students to raise self-awareness, learn to be grateful, do reflection, and act out the spirit of Magis, doing better, in their daily lives. Wahyanites are also empowered with self-directed learning skills to set goals, learn for life and learn through life.

Reviewing His Tenure as the Principal of WYK

Before joining WYK, Mr. Chung was the principal of St. Bonaventure College & High School for five years (hereinafter St. Bonaventure). He shared the differences in his experience of being the principal of both schools. First of all, WYK is one of the city's prestigious schools, and there is a broader spectrum of stakeholders in the WYK community than those in St. Bonaventure. Hence, the expectations

and opinions of different parties could be diverse. No matter what, he hopes we treasure unity in diversity and our brotherhood can keep us as one. Besides, WYK emphasizes the holistic growth of students; hence, students have busy yet colourful school lives, ranging from entering different competitions, helping in Caritas Charity Bazaars, enjoying a variety of sports and performing in school concerts. Lastly, as WYK has a long history, it has many traditions that have come along. "We have to be cautious that while we cherish our traditions, we have to be aware that, as time goes by, some practices might gradually become traditionalism, and we should never be tied down by it," Mr. Chung said.

WYK began implementing small class teaching in 2008 with financial support from Wah Yan One Family Foundation. In each form, five classes were split into six classes. Mr. Chung observed that the smaller number of students in each class could help teachers take better care of individual needs. Besides, the students could concentrate better in class. Unfortunately, due to the limitation of funding, small class education was discontinued in 2019. He is grateful to all the donors, mainly alumni, for their continued support for WYK, which makes realizing the vision of our Jesuit education a much easier task.

Mr. Chung also talked about the different curricula in Hong Kong. Schools under the Direct Subsidy Scheme (DSS) charge school fees, so they have the resources to offer the IB Diploma Programme. The IB Programme is structured on project-based learning, which aims at training students to research, organize and present their work. Therefore, students under the IB Programme are better at oral presentations than their peers in schools under the HKDSE. Yet, university admissions officers should realize that students under the HKDSE are equally good as the HKDSEE is indeed a highly competitive

examination. As an aided school, WYK could not offer the IB curriculum for students, but at the same time, the HKDSE caters better to the needs of students from underprivileged families, congruent with the Jesuit education vision to provide equal opportunities for all students.

During his tenure as the principal of WYK, Hong Kong experienced waves of political turmoil, including the Umbrella Movement in 2014 and the Anti-Extradition Law Amendment Bill Movement in 2019. How did WYK help Wahyanites get through those tough and critical moments? Mr. Chung stressed the importance of companionship and respect. Only when students' voices were heard and their opinions were valued could the tension ease and the students learn to be reflective and respectful. He appreciated how Wahyanites showed respect to one another and reflected on social issues from different perspectives.

Despite the difficulties described above, Mr. Chung was happy to see the progress in the academic and non-academic performance of Wahyanites. "Students' performance in the HKDSEE has been getting better and better. The rate of offers from local universities for admissions via JUPAS has been raised to 84%, almost twofold," Mr. Chung shared with the interviewer. Mr. the Chung also reviewed latest development in different areas and highlighted the awards won by Wahyanites in their extra-curricular activities, such as music, sports, STEM and debates, etc. As an educator, he feels the greatest satisfaction is to see that students can realize their potential, make history together for WYK and have the competence, commitment, compassion and conscience to make the world a better place.

Plan after Retirement

"Wherever I am needed, I am going there (original quotation in Chinese:「哪裡有需要,就往哪裡去。」). This quote has inspired me a lot." Mr. Chung read this quote in a book about Jesuit education. Indeed, St. Francis Xavier lived out this quote with his voyage across the oceans, reaching India and Japan and finally landing on Shangchuan Island of China. Many of his fellow Jesuits followed his path, including the Irish Jesuits serving in Wah Yan

Although Mr. Chung received an offer from an international school in mainland China, he decided to continue to contribute to the education in Hong Kong, the home that needs him the most. He will stay in Hong Kong to accompany those who stay.


Save the WYIR dates: 10 & 11 December 2022

Universe Soccer School is a soccer school which provides soccer training for youth aged 3-14. The founder of the Universe Soccer School is Mr. Poon Kwong Tak (WYK'92) who aims at utilizing such a platform to not only connect with all alumni of Wah Yan College, Kowloon (WYK), but also allow their children to develop an interest in soccer at the unique grass soccer field at WYK. By doing so, the next generation of Wahyanites will bring honour to WYK by winning trophies in soccer competitions.

Universe Soccer School has spared no effort in promoting soccer at WYK by providing free systematic soccer training for junior Wahyanites in order to increase the number of soccer players at WYK. Over the past few years, more than 100 students have benefitted from the training program.
